NWF Basketball schedules announced

The Bart Walker era of NWF Women's Basketball will begin on November 3rd when the Lady Raiders host Volunteer State Community College. This game will kick off a tough non-conference schedule for the Lady Raiders, who return 2 players from last year's team. January 6th will mark the beginning of the rigorous conference schedule. As always, the Panhandle Conference looks to be strong this year, featuring the defending back-to-back national champions, Gulf Coast State College. There will be a lot of new faces on the Lady Raider's roster, including 5 players with international playing experience and several Division 1 transfers.

Coach Steve DeMeo and the Raiders will start the 2017-18 men's basketball season with several pre-season scrimmages throughout the month of October. The Raiders will be playing in the Arena for the first home game of the season on November 3rd, right after the women's game. The first half of their season will feature the Bruce Stewart Classic where the Raiders will host Spartanburg Methodist and San Jacinto – both made appearances in last year's national tournament. They will then be travelling to Monroe College in New York for a 3-day tournament facing some elite competition. The Raiders have 3 returners from last year's Final Four squad,

led by point guard Andres Feliz. Some new players to keep an eye on will be transfers Derek Funderburk (Ohio State), Bryce Peters (Colorado), Kelvin Robinson (Appalachian State), and Tray Boyd (Union University).

Collegiate High School senior Ashlyn Rhea is collecting medical supplies to send to the victims of Hurricanes Harvey and Irma as a part of her Senior Capstone Project.

The Collegiate High Capstone Project requires students to complete at least 15 work hours within their intended field of study. Rhea aspires to be a surgeon, so she decided her project would be within the medical field.

Rhea said she knew what the service aspect of her project would be as soon as she saw the devastation from Hurricane Harvey, and she knew she wanted to expand the services when Hurricane Irma devastated her home state.

Rhea is collecting the following items: peroxide, first aid ointment, Band-Aids, Advil, deodorant, toothpaste, toothbrushes, baby powder, hand sanitizer, shampoo, conditioner, wet wipes, Clorox wipes, flashlights, batteries, towels, feminine products, diapers and soap.
