This is a Gordon Rule writing course and is part of the college's Writing-Across-the-Curriculum program. A minimum grade of "C" is required if used to meet Gordon Rule requirements for general education.

Composes formal assignments applying the conventions of Standard American English in written and/or oral communication.

## **Objectives**

Understand and apply the concepts of purpose, audience, and rhetorical situation in written and/or oral communication.

Apply basic principles of logic and critical thinking as evidenced through written and/or oral communication.

Effectively integrate and appropriately document selected ideas, themes, and concepts from a variety of print and/or electronic sources.

## **Student Expectations of the Course**
